
FIRST MEETING SATURDAY 22ND APRIL 1899

The first meeting of Laois County Council took place in the Grand Jury Room of Maryborough Courthouse at 11.30am on Saturday 22nd April 1899. Mr. Richard Bull, Returning Officer and Sub-Sheriff for the Queens County got proceedings underway.

Mr. Patrick A. Meehan was elected Chairperson who accepted by saying:

'Gentlemen, representatives of Queens County, I have to tender to you the expression of my heartfelt thanks for the honour you have just conferred on me... I don't regard it with the exaltation of an individual. I regard it as a vindication and the exaltation of the Nationalist principles with which I have identified, and in which I have endeavoured to take a man's part of nearly thirty years in Queens County.... Let all of us endeavour to faithfully interpret to the best of our ability the will of the electors who have entrusted us with their confidence.'

This was the dawning of democracy in County Laois.

For 125 years Local Government in Laois has provided a portal through which people can give expression to local identity, to articulate local concerns and to put in train solutions to local challenges. This publication serves as a memento of democratic Local Government in Laois over this timespan. It records in summary fashion some of the landmark achievements of Local Government over that period, delivering public health services to the community, housing, roads, motorways, libraries, playgrounds, drainage schemes and so on. It depicts changes in culture, ideology, society and in local politics. The journey through independence, conflicts, external strife, pandemics and modernisation has all been witnessed through the stable eyes of Local Government since 1899. Most of all, however, this publication is about people. It is a salutation to the many who have come forward from their communities, who as Councillors have entered a very public arena and who have given their time, energy, and commitment to improving the lives of people in Laois. Rolling back the Years Laois in the early 20th Century

Tuberculosis

A new sanatorium was opened in May of 1911 by Lord Lieutenant and Lady Aberdeen in the presence of many invited guests including the Chairman of the Council, P.A. Meehan, M.P.

At the Council meeting held on the 13th June 1912 the following scheme was submitted for the treatment of tuberculosis in the County that:

'The existing sanatorium in the County Infirmary grounds be acquired for the purpose of a dispensary, and the sum of £300 be paid to the Infirmary Committee for the buildings and reconstruction work to be done'.



Roads

'James Quinlan was appointed roads overseer in August 1915 at a wage of 10 shillings per week'— At the time the County was divided into four areas.



A gang of men was appointed to the various sections and in some instances two to three gangs worked a section.
Gravel for road repairs was excavated manually from the gravel pits around the county and was transported by horse and cart to the desired locations.

1921 Troubled Times

Following the signing of the Treaty and the resulting split in the Government forces the County gradually became embroiled in Civil War. These were confusing and dangerous times in a troubled Ireland. Laoighis did not entirely escape the fallout from conflict. On a number of occasions **rate collectors for the County were robbed** of their collections and the County Surveyor and his crews spent much time repairing bridges and roads that had been damaged by the various forces. Workers in the employment of the County Council were also threatened with violence if they were perceived to be defying any of the

orders' of the different factions.

At the meeting of the County Council, on 2nd of April 1922, the county surveyor reported that 'many of the bridges which had been impassable had been repaired. Since that date, 19 bridges had been destroyed or rendered impassable. Three of the bridges had been partly destroyed during the 'terror".



1926

On the 17th of August 1926, the temporary appointment of a County Librarian was approved, on a rate of £250pa and the library received a grant of £2000 from the Carnegie Trust for the maintenance and capital works of the library. The first library in Portlaoise was situated in what is now the Courthouse. Trinity educated



and Protestant, Miss Helen Roe was the first female, Protestant librarian in the Irish Free State.




1930s

The construction of the new County Hospital was also in the news and the Leinster Express reported in September 1934:

'Messrs. Scott & Good architects, submitted a block plan showing the area required was 6 acres for the site of the hospital, which will have a total capacity of 74 beds, and will cost approximately £65,000, and situated a short distance from the town'.



During the War Years

At a meeting of the County Council dated 12th December 1943 the following proposal from Mr. O.J Flanagan which was seconded by Mr. Wm Bolton (Timahoe) and resolved: 'That the Minister for Supplies be asked to provide bicycle tyres for County Councillors to attend meetings and who have long distances to travel in discharge of their duties'. Ireland slowly adjusted to life after the war and it was not until 1948 that the country and indeed the County Councils could actively involve themselves in schemes such as housing or road works.

Laois County Council, approved the plans submitted by the architect Mr. Frank Gibney, for

four new housing schemes in non-municipal towns. This meant that work will start on building much needed houses. The scheme provided for a total of 303 new houses.

Under this new scheme Mountmellick area will have 64 new houses, Portarlington 49, Rathdowney 32,



Mountrath 22, Stradbally 20 and Durrow 15. Bathrooms will be an added facility in these houses.

County Councillors realised very early that enormous changes would have to be made in the upkeep of the road network.

Throughout the decade large sums of money continued to



be spent on the purchase of machinery so that by the end of the 1950's, Laois County Council could proudly boast of some of the best roads in Ireland.



The Council's ambitious housing programme was located all around the County and aimed at providing both in the rural and urban areas. On 26th August 1950 the Leinster Express reported:

'The 52 new houses being built at Borris Road, Portlaoise, will soon be ready for occupation. This will be the first post-war town housing scheme to be completed in Laois' Throughout this time the question of financing housing schemes posed a serious problem especially with relation to the increased burden that these schemes would place on the rates.

1960s Developments

The Library Service in Laois came to prominence at this time especially after the appointment of a Library Advisory Committee on the proposal of Councillor O. J. Flanagan.

The County Secretary intimated that agreement had been reached with the Irish Worsted Mills Ltd. for the purchase by the



Council of land at Knockmay, Portlaoise, for the sum of £5,000. It was anticipated that the cost of acquiring land and access to it together with other expenses will bring the all in cost to £6,000. The site will, in the first instance be reserved to industrial purposes.





Public Convenience

The 1960s were notable also for the controversy that continued throughout the whole decade with regard to the provision of a public convenience for Portlaoise.

Despite continuous discussions over the decade it was not until late 1970s that this matter was finally settled as was reported in the Leinster Express on the 15th August:

'Following years of debate, an important event will take place in Portlaoise within a month or so - the opening of the town's first public toilet. But there will be no official ceremony to mark the occasion and, therefore, whoever initiates the convenience will probably remain anonymous'! The toilet was located at Tower Hill on part of the site now occupied by the Millview Housing Estate. It was subsequently closed and eventually demolished in 1996.



Industrial Development

Employment prospects for the people of Laois, particularly Portlaoise seemed to be improving rapidly as can be seen in the Leinster Express, dated 11th November 1972.

The Industrial Development Authority approved, a grant to a German Company, Herman Etschied OHG, for the establishment of a plant in Portlaoise to manufacture stainless steel equipment.

Mr. P.J. Lalor, T.D. pointed out that this factory, along with two other industries which had been acquired for Portlaoise, the Tretorn and Compac factories, would provide total employment for about 700 people in the Portlaoise area.

This, he said, augured well for the town and surrounding districts.

Tourism and Heritage - The early years

The cause for Tourism and Heritage took a substantial leap forward during the 1970s.

In September 1974 it was agreed by the members that the Council bring to the notice of Bord Failte and other interested bodies, the tourist and recreational potential of Granstown Lake, Ballacolla and that the Department

Among the developments listed were the Barrow Valley and Slieve Bloom Amenity Area. Among discussion was the development of Granstown Lake.


In May 1976 details of the progress with regard to the Slieve Bloom project were brought before the Council. By this time car parks were either complete or near completion at The Cut, Clonaslee, Glendine Valley and Glinks Hill, while picnic areas and viewing points were provided at Bawnree Cottage and Capard Ridge. Road surfacing was taking place at several locations to allow easier access for both pedestrians and cars. The Council was informed that the expenditure of £25,000 would be met 50% by Bord Failte, and 16% by Offaly County Council.


New Home for Laois County Council

In December 1981, The Leinster Express and Nationalist described the move of the

administrative staff into their luxurious new office complex:

'What a complete change from the old Council offices and at last Laois has a modern complex to put it on the map. The four storey County Hall, as it has been christened, is even more impressive inside than it is externally. It was no wonder that there was an air of pride matching the luxurious interior when the Council staff moved in on Tuesday at their new starting time of 9 am. The ladies on the staff were looking the part with their uniforms which they themselves provided at their own expense. The spirit was high all round. The carpets, tinted windows, car park, landscaping, furniture and open plan sophistication of





the building throughout; the lifts, canteen and balcony; the marble counter reception with a full information service; the planning and motor tax offices to the right and left of the entrance on the ground floor make for a sharp contrast to the cold, stoned floor, disjointed Courthouse on the Main Street - at last the county has a showpiece'.

The formal opening of the complex was held in May 1982 when Mr. Tom Keenan, M.C.C., Chairman of the County Council cut the tape.

Housing Investment - a continuing challenge

In May 1980, the first 60 houses of the Council housing scheme at Knockmay were officially opened by Mr. G. Connolly, T.D. Minister of State at the Department of the Environmment, the housing scheme was the first stage of the development of 70 acres of land acquired by Laois County Council approximately 10 years previous, the development, in addition to local authority housing, included a church, schools, community centre,

headquarters for the Vocational Education Committee, private housing, open spaces and games facilities.

Throughout the 1980's during a period of financial bleakness the Council did indeed strive to provide necessary housing and housing schemes were constructed at Mountmellick, Errill, Portarlington, Abbeyleix, Ballybritttas, Clonaslee, Durrow and Rathdowney.

A housing progress report in September 1985 detailed the following facts:







Reform and Expansion 1990's

The Portlaoise By-Pass was at a stage where the route had been selected and a motorway scheme had been prepared. The scheme was submitted to the Minister for the **Environment in** 1990 for his approval. This project was to become at that time the most significant development ever undertaken by the Council culminating in its construction, completion and official opening in May of 1997.

Dunamaise Arts Centre- May 1999

The opening of the Dunamaise Theatre and Centre for the Arts by Ms. Síle De Valera, Minister for Arts, Heritage, Gaeltacht and The Islands took place in May 1999. Under the ownership of Laois County Council the 240 seated Theatre provided the much needed facilities for arts and cultural infrastructure in Laois.

Electric Picnic 2004

The first event licence granted by Laois County Council for the Electric Picnic was in 2004. The Electric Picnic began as a one-day event in 2004, with 10,000 concert-goers before growing to a weekend-long festival and 70,000 people converging on Laois each year for the past 20 years.



Abbeyleix Library 2008

Construction of the new library and art gallery was completed in May 2008 and the library was opened to the public in June 2008. The official opening was performed by John Gormley, T.D., Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government. The Library (formerly Market House) was built in the mid 1800's and Abbeyleix Fire service occupied the ground floor and the library service was housed on the upper floor prior to its re-development in 2008.

M7/M8

On 28th May 2010 the final section of the new Dublin to Cork motorway opened in Co Laois - bypassing the towns of Abbeyleix, **Durrow and Cullahill** shortening the journey for motorists by up to 45 minutes at peak times. The new M7-M8 motorway opened to traffic four months ahead of schedule. The opening of 41km of motorway was a vital link in the development of a high quality road network throughout Co Laois, connecting Co Laois to Dublin, the Midwest, the South and the North through a high quality reliable road transport







corridor which paved the way for increased economic growth and prosperity.

2016 Centenary Celebrations In 2016, Laois commemorated the

commemorated the centenary of the 1916 Rising.

J17 National Enterprise Park

In 2018 Laois County Council launched the Togher Area Masterplan. The vision for the J17 National Enterprise Park



was to deliver a viable economic zone, as a National Enterprise Park, focused particularly on heavy, light and ICT industry, distribution, logistics and other uses associated with the transport industry. This has the potential to be a major boost to the economy of Portlaoise through enterprise and employment and to contribute to the growth of the County and the Region as a whole. The vision by Laois County Council has come to fruition with numerous businesses now in operation, employing over 500 people.





Urban Regeneration Development Fund (URDF)

The URDF is currently funding 3 projects in Portlaoise with a total funding allocation of over €18.2 million.

Under Call 1 in 2019, Laois County Council was awarded over €9 million of URDF funding for public realm works under two projects, 'A Cultural Quarter' and 'A Low Carbon Town'. In 2021, the Department approved an additional funding of over €160k towards the Cultural Quarter project.

In 2021, under Call 2 of the URDF, the Department provisionally allocated €9 million in funding to Laois County Council for the 'Placemaking for a Low Carbon Town' project which follows on from the Call 1 project.

New County Library

This project was for the provision of a new county library in Portlaoise and received funding of €2,787,253 from the URDF along with €3,000,000 from the Department of Rural and Community Development. This project is now complete and was officially opened by Minister Heather Humphries in July 2023.



World Ploughing Championships

Laois welcomed the World Ploughing Championships in 2022, one of the largest outdoor events in Europe. It attracted over 270,000 visitors in 2022 with over 1,700 exhibitors on site to Laois. Competitors from all over the world converged on Laois and Laois County Council held a reception in



honour of the world ploughing organisation and the national ploughing association.

Covid-19 Pandemic

In March 2022, a little over two years since the Covid-19 pandemic arrived in Ireland and changed our lives, Laois County Council organised a dignified ceremony in Portlaoise to remember all those who have lost their lives during the pandemic and to pay tribute to those who contributed to how we faced the challenges together.

Ukrainian Response

At the start of 2022, little did we know that the invasion of Ukraine would result in one of the largest displacements of people



sine the second World War. A dedicated Ukrainian Response Team was established within the Council to provide the necessary supports and address the challenges arising. The Council continues to meet its obligations and support the humanitarian response effort.

Housing

A record number of almost 500 individuals and families were given low-cost rental social homes in 2023 in the County.

Laois County Council are currently two years into our Housing for All four-year

programme, have already exceeded the targets set by Government of 534 new homes by 2026, having reached 515 after just two years.

Laois County Council launched its first Local Authority Affordable Purchase Scheme in Portlaoise in December 2023. A total of 16 new houses were available in Kilminchy, Dublin Road, Portlaoise under the scheme.
