Pauline and Helena organized a staff volunteer day by teaming up with Laois Volunteers and the Abbeyleix bog project. The volunteers learned about the bog, cleared *Rhododendron ponticum*, and had an absolutely amazing day! *Rhododendron ponticum* is toxic to animals and it can cause 'Mad honey' disease, poisioning those who consume it.


## **National Ploughing Championships**

## **BOLT eBike Update**

We've received fantastic feedback from BOLT about the ebike usage in Portlaoise! Each bike is averaging 2.1 trips per day, with rides lasting around 12.9 minutes.

Thanks to the successful uptake, Portlaoise will soon get at least 20 more ebikes. BOLT keeps a close eye on the data, ensuring each bike is well-maintained and batteries are swapped out when they hit 20%. Since July 30th, we've proudly logged 3,514 trips, covering a total of 8,799 kilometers. Keep pedaling, Portlaoise!
